


<b>AIPG SECTION:</b>	Arizona
<b>DELEGATE:</b>	Barbara Murphy (for Doug Bartlett)
<b>A) 2017 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?</b>	<p>Through efforts led by AZ Section President Doug Bartlett along with AIPG members Richard Brose and Linda Lassiter, a new student chapter was established at Northern Arizona University (NAU) in Flagstaff, Arizona. The new student chapter was approved in early 2017.</p> <p>Arizona Section provided some funding for AIPG national student scholarships for \$500 each awarded to two Arizona university students.</p> <p>Arizona Section provided TPGs to Arizona State University Geology Department.</p>
<b>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</b>	<p>Plan to participate with NAU Student Chapter throughout the year. Also plan to participate in student career nights or similar if asked at NAU, U. of Arizona, and Arizona State University. AZ Section members have participated in the past but sometimes the event is cancelled because of lack of interest.</p>
<b>C) Problems/issues within the section: How can National help?</b>	<p>Trying to get others to volunteer and serve on the executive board is always a challenge. Also just keeping the executive board active has been a challenge as some members have been working out of state most of the year. We had a section meeting with AEG that went well. The dinner meeting with talk in Phoenix was well-attended. We used to have an annual business meeting in February at the AZ Geological Survey in Tucson but the AZGS funding and structure changed dramatically in 2016 and moved to much smaller building so no longer have a meeting place. The section needs to get some stronger commitments from all on executive board. Problem is this is all volunteer and several on board had change in job commitments and just could not be as active. Also, lot of time in 2016 was spent on fighting legislative issues so a bit of burn out factor.</p>
<b>D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?</b>	<p>Provide more funding to sections to subsidize meeting costs and field trips and when necessary, funds for legislative issues. The AZ section spent quite a bit of money in 2016 on legislative issues in Arizona which had significant threats to professional standards and requirements of geologists. Key members of the AZ section spent quite a bit of time and effort along with hired lobbyists to fight several bills and get some amendments for better outcomes.</p>



<b>AIPG SECTION:</b>	California Section
<b>DELEGATE:</b>	James Jacobs, California Section President
<b>A) 2017 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?</b>	We had 4 AIPG California Section meetings: (2) at UC Davis (October 2016 and March 2017) and (2) at Sonoma State University (November 2016 and April 2017) so that both student sections could meet each other. We also had a group field trip (May 2017) to the New Almaden Mercury Mine in San Jose. We also had a December 2016 teleconference call-in on job interview skills, networking and resume preparation. AIPG California Section provided 2 judges for the state science fair and cash prizes were awarded. The California Section active members have focused on student activities: Mark Rogers, Dave Sadoff, Mehmet Pehlivan, Steve Baker, Bill Motzer, Karel Detterman, Stephen Testa, Rob Campbell, Bob Syndor, Nicholas Pinter, Robert Zierenberg as well as the increasing California AIPG Student members.
<b>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</b>	We will try to continue the push for student sections. The question is whether there is a reasonable conversion rate from student members to full members, as that rate will confirm AIPG's true value to students. Likewise we need to get professors to see the value in AIPG in preparing students and professors for the working world. What is needed is more assistance in career development and steering. Being laid off is one of the most common experience that unites geologists - and how to bounce back can be an opportunity facilitated by AIPG.
<b>C) Problems/issues within the section: How can National help?</b>	Getting older members to meetings is pretty hard, even though the meetings and field trips are free and in some cases, include free food. Distance is a problem with larger states. Getting universities to sign up for student chapters. I have tried to coax other universities to sign up and it has been difficult to get the form filled out. I suggest a Fellows Program to get more interest of the more senior members, who are also likely to serve as mentors.
<b>D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?</b>	More funds for the student sections. I would like to give them at least \$500 each per year for free pizzas at our meetings. I would ask for more prizes or scholarships. More funds to provide reimbursement for leader's costs, more funding to send more members to the national meeting. On a larger scale, I would put money into a mentor's fellowship that allows for experienced (Fellows?) to interact with younger members for the purpose of mentoring and meeting with more students or performing outreach or specific humanitarian projects. Provide funding for more Washington, D.C. fly-ins. Getting the new Executive Director to each section!

<p><b>C) Problems/issues within the section: How can National help?</b></p>	<p><b>Problem:</b> Continued apathy among members, low membership to PG ratio (only 20%), limited section activities/offerings based on existing revenue stream.</p> <p>Continue to strategize with AIPG on how to increase state PG membership through increased membership value. Viable solutions will provide stronger membership, increased revenue and activity opportunities and a greater legislative voice to protect PG scope of practice and licensure.</p> <p><b>Problem:</b> Florida PG's continue to combat proposed legislation that undermines licensure and scope of practice. In 2017 section lobbyist and PG's fought proposed language that would have removed geology business licensure for the second year in a row it is expected challenges threatening licensure will continue in 2018.</p> <p>A continuing education (CE) program would help to strengthen PG's by providing additional professional credibility and increased revenues. A CE program coupled with strong legislative engagement through section contributions and volunteer participation in campaigns will serve to elevate, strengthen and protect the geology profession. AIPG may consider providing CE program management to state sections.</p>



<b>AIPG SECTION:</b>	Kentucky
<b>DELEGATE:</b>	Mark Sweet
<b>A) 2017 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?</b>	KY Section Executive Committee members have made contact with, and held meet and greet events for several state universities (see B). These functions seek to introduce students to AIPG benefits, and to introduce students to local AIPG members for Q&A and networking opportunities. In 2017, we have had multiple meetings with ECU to develop a Geology Department alumni directory. We scheduled, but had to cancel, a resume writing seminar in 2017 that we plan to offer again in 2018.
<b>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</b>	University of Kentucky (UK), Eastern Kentucky University (EKU), Western Kentucky University (WKU), and Northern Kentucky University (NKU), where we have active AIPG Student Chapters. We have also made contact with Morehead State University (MSU).
<b>C) Problems/issues within the section: How can National help?</b>	Declining membership seems to be the greatest problem, as many members are retiring. Student membership is strong but many do not transition to full-time membership after obtaining degrees. The number of mid-career geologist members is weak, but retainage among older membership is good. I feel there is a general feeling that a professional organization offers little benefit relative to dues amounts. AIPG could share successful strategies used in other states to help improve membership, especially among that career-age demographic.
<b>D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?</b>	1-Working from lists supplied by the Section, make one-on-one contact with prospective members to explain the benefits of membership. When positive results are made, arrange for Section members to make follow up contact. AIPG could bear the cost of follow up meetings (mileage and the reasonable cost of a meal). 2-Make contact with universities to obtain and curate geologic collections as university departments merge and decrease in size, and 3-create a Natural Science and History Museum in every state.

These are awarded at our last Section meeting.</li> <li>• \$2,000 annually to each of four undergraduate student chapters (\$8,000 total)</li> <li>• \$1,000 to Michigan Alliance for Environmental and Outdoor Education</li> <li>• \$3,000 to Academy of Natural Resources. ANR offers educators the opportunity to learn about Michigan's diverse natural resources.</li> <li>• \$4,000 MI Section Andrew Mozola Scholarship</li> <li>• \$300 Purchase of 90 copies of TPG for students</li> </ul> <p>Our Student Chapter Committee Chair, John Barkach, also a past Michigan Section President, holds conference calls with the student chapters. We have four student chapters, as follows:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Central Michigan University,</li> <li>2. Eastern Michigan University,</li> <li>3. Wayne State University, and</li> <li>4. Western Michigan University.</li> </ol> <p>We would also like to note that Wayne State University was selected as the 2017 Student Chapter of the Year.</p> <p>We are working to set up another student chapter at Michigan Technological University in Houghton.</p>
<b>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</b>	<p>We had our first Section meeting of the year at Central Michigan University. The students helped organize and participated with updating us with their activities.
