


<i>AIPG</i>	SECTION REPORT and DESIGNATION OF OFFICIAL SECTION DELEGATE
AIPG SECTION:	Alaska
DELEGATE:	Keri A. Nutter
A) 2016 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	The University of Alaska Anchorage Student Chapter was formed and approved in February 2016. Keri Nutter, the student chapter sponsor, met with the new student chapter prior to the end of the 2016 school year; a second meeting is planned for the end of September 2016 for the upcoming school year. Students have also been invited to all section events and activities. Held a booth at the UAA Geoscience Career Fair in February 2016.
B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?	We plan to visit all three universities in Anchorage and Fairbanks. Meetings regularly happen at UAA in Anchorage and we plan to combine students from UAA and Alaska Pacific University due to their proximity to each other. Plans to visit the students at UAF will be implemented once the new school year is underway.
C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?	No major concerns within the Alaska Section at this time. The issue of geology engineering practice guidelines within the State is unresolved. Recently the engineers have been silent on the issue; however, we have not obtained proper recognition through a memorandum of understanding for work we are both qualified to do.
D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?	More/larger scholarships for students, both undergraduate, graduate, and non-traditional students (those returning to school). Assistance with licensing and testing of geologists in non-licensure states. More student scholarships and opportunities for sponsoring young professionals at conferences, AIPG meetings, and AIPG section activities/field trips.



A) 2016 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	We attended the AEG 11 th Annual Student Night at Arizona State University. We had discussions with staff to gather feedback and support for a student chapter at ASU. In May 2016, we awarded a scholarship to Anna Schuh, a student at the University of Arizona. We will work with Anna to establish a Student Chapter at U of A.
B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?	We typically participate in a career/student night at each of the three major Universities, (ASU, U of A, and NAU) in Arizona.
C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?	<p>Low turnout and participation. Typically the same members participate in field trips and events. We are getting a few more to participate, but most seem content as just members. It would be nice to see a list of those that are voting. National holds great Annual Meetings, and it would be nice find a way to get more Arizona and other section members to attend. A short survey sent via email might gather some insight as to why more are not attending (Time, Cost, Location, Work or Family Conflicts, etc.).</p> <p>Doug Bartlett led the effort opposing HB2613, which would have deregulated Geologists in Arizona. We anticipate this to be a problem in the future. Arizona Section members signed the petition and contacted their representatives.</p>
D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?	<p>Partner with others to create a National Geology Channel, a digital cable and satellite television/internet channel that would produce shows, series, and documentaries about Geological Sciences. A) 2015-6 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	7 regular AIPG California Section – UC Davis Student Section Meetings in Davis (Oct-May); 1 Field Trip; Professors R. Zierenberg/N. Pinter, (Advisors), J. Jacobs (Sponsor), S. Baker, R. Campbell, W. Motzer, and R. Sydnor (Mentors); B. Motzer ran a spring field trip to Ring Mountain (Tiburon, California). Corresponded with other colleges about student sections. For 10+ years, judged State Science Fair (M. Rogers and M. Pehlivan, Judges 2016). The student awards have been sponsored by the California Section (treasurer, K. Detterman). M. Pehlivan and M. Rogers also represented AIPG in the AIPG booth at the Ontario, California GSA meeting in 2016.
B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?	Sonoma State University in Rohnert Park signed up as a student section in June 2016 - Professor Matthew James, Advisor, J. Jacobs, Sponsor, S. Baker and R. Campbell, Mentors. We will hold 4-6 joint Sonoma State University – UC Davis Student Section group meetings, and a field trip. Five other universities have been contacted. The California Section will work with president Michaela Gnos (2016-2017) and past president Chris Holt; UC Davis Section and president Maureen Redmond (Sonoma State University; 2016-2017) for ideas on how to engage more students in the state.
C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?	For 2015-2016 the California Section has had 7 meetings and 1 terrific field trip this year. Getting more involvement from AIPG professional members would be great. This relates to the concept of “attract-retain-engage.” We need to hit the sweet spot of engagement where it becomes a no-brainer to participate. By contrast, National Ground Water Association has 10,500 members and gets over 5,000 participants to their annual Las Vegas meeting. (They just instituted the NGWA Fellows Program). AIPG has about 7,500 members and attendance in our meetings is about 200-300.
D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Free training webinars; • Mentoring program to engage senior members as mentors and young professionals/students; • International student sections; • AIPG Fellows Program; • Grants for mentoring and outreach; • Student to Professional Retention Study to optimize our success. • Methods to develop more involvement of members (CEUs); and • More rigorous CPG2 with CEUs, etc.



A) 2016 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	We have two very active student chapters at Metro State in Denver and UNC in Greeley. We support these chapters with grants and with advice. The contacts are Tom Van Arsdale and David Abbott. The MSU chapter won student chapter of the year and the Section is responsible for all of the costs associated with this award.: the \$500 award, plaque, certificates for the student chapter officers), and the AIPG label pin, providing flight, extra baggage charges, hotel, meeting registration, and awards dinner cost for one of the student chapter officers to attend the annual meeting.
B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?	David Abbott visited Fort Lewis College in March and gave 3 lectures to the Geology Department and Geology Club. Our Grand Junction area members interact with the Geology Department at Colorado Mesa University.
C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?	For the last few years, the Colo Section has run at a deficit. This year we held a special meeting of the ExCom to address this issue. It is not likely that our income will increase next year, it will likely go down as we continue into even more difficult economic times. We can no longer afford to retain our lobbyist on contract, even though we believe there have been some positive impacts as a result of our lobbying efforts. We are exploring having our lobbyist available to help us take on the lobbying responsibilities ourselves.
D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?	We could use more money and could use help if organizing a seminar in these difficult times. However, costs would have to be held down so that people could afford to attend since many are out of work, or their companies are no longer support educational activities or conferences.



A) 2016 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	<p>Student Chapters:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • University of South Florida (USF) became Florida's third student chapter in March joining Florida State University (FSU) and Florida Atlantic University (FSU) as Florida's AIPG Student Chapters. <p>Activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A 2016 AIPG Workshop entitled "Water Resources Unplugged" was held in Orlando. It was a great success! Event provided student volunteer opportunities and participation. • Co-sponsored 2nd Annual Winter Water Seminar (FAPG-AIPG, Florida Engineering Society, and Florida Department of Environmental Protection) near FSU campus. Annual event gaining more attention and greater opportunity for AIPG and FAPG involvement. • Held two workshops on Geologist-In-Training certification, resume writing and interview preparation (FSU and USF). • Provided student mentoring on internship and career opportunities • Provided professional support at Cub and Boy Scout events to support earning geology badge. • FAPG-AIPG members are board members at the Friends of the Gale Academy of Environmental Science & Technology. • Encouraged attendance/ provide standing opportunity for scholarships to attend state fieldtrips. • Purchased and provided copies of TPG to five local university geology departments along with student chapter information to three. • Participated in Southeastern Geological Society (SEGS) fieldtrip to Everglades National Park led in part by University of Miami to promote AIPG to students. • Held Annual Section Board Meeting attended by FAU Student Chapter President and Regional Coordinator Troy Bernier. Provided direct opportunity for collaboration and input. • Recent graduate Brandy Barnes was named FAPG-AIPG Young Professional Board Advisor. • Committed to increase newsletter distribution to at least bi-annual, • Worked with lobbyist and several PG's on Privatization of PG License Management and Continuing Education Program. Distributed Fact Sheet to membership, drafted legislative language, and initiated discussions with AIPG regarding national interest in creating non-profit management corporation. • Drafted proposed legislative language to:

<p>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Plan to hold workshops at 3-4 universities including Florida Gulf Coast University in November 2016, USF in October 2016, FSU in January 2017 and UF (unscheduled). ● 2016-17 goal is to bring University of Florida on as an AIPG Student Chapter ● Plan to hold a “Review and Skills for ASBOG Fundamentals Exam Part 1” (Florida and Kentucky Section collaboration) in early 2017 at Florida university campus.
<p>C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?</p>	<p>Problem: Continued apathy among members, low membership to PG ratio (only 20%), limited section activities/offerings based on existing revenue stream.</p> <p>Continue to strategize with AIPG on how to increase state PG membership through increased membership value. Viable solutions will provide stronger membership, increased revenue and activity opportunities and a greater legislative voice to protect PG scope of practice and licensure.</p> <p>Problem: Florida PG’s continue to combat proposed legislation that undermines licensure and scope of practice. In 2016 section lobbyist and PG’s fought proposed language that would have removed geology business licensure.</p> <p>A continuing education (CE) program would help to strengthen PG’s by providing additional professional credibility and increased revenues. A CE program coupled with strong legislative engagement through section contributions and volunteer participation in campaigns will serve to elevate, strengthen and protect the geology profession. AIPG should consider providing CE program management to state sections.</p> <p>Problem: The Florida Board of Professional Geologists (BOPG) that currently manages PG licensure is operating in the red. This budget trend is expected to continue into the future and further erode license and scope of practice protection.</p> <p>Vulnerability can be remedied by resolving BOPG projected budget deficits by reducing large administrative overhead and providing for a scalable fee structure that allows the board to set license fees to match the budget requirements. Privatization of PG licensure management should provide the solution. Chapter 432.32, Florida Statutes – The Management Privatization</p>

	Act allows a non-profit corporation to provide regulation services for a professional practice in Florida. AIPG should consider providing license management services.
D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Additional scholarships to send students to AIPG annual conference. • AIPG share financial responsibilities with sections that win annual student chapter of the year award.







A) 2015 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	<p>The Michigan Section holds quarterly meetings at various locations around the State to engage members living in different geographical areas. We also have partnered with other professional science organization to jointly host several quarterly meetings including the forthcoming September 29, 2016 meeting together with the Michigan Association of Environmental Professionals. Speakers from EPA and MDEQ will be speaking on Detroit Area Brownfields Related to Riverfront Development. Most meetings are staged at universities to allow participation by student chapter groups and faculty sponsors. We begin with an executive committee meeting, followed by a social hour, dinner, and guest speaker presenting a topic of interest to our membership. The February 2016 meeting was a joint meeting of AIPG MI Section and the Michigan Basin Geological Society. The February meeting was held at Cleary College in Howell and Bob Mahin, CPG, Ludson Mining Corporation, gave a great talk entitled "Exploration at Eagle/Eagle East (Ni-Cu minerlization), North Central Upper Peninsula of Michigan: A Model-Driven Discovery. The April 2016 meeting was held at Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant, MI. David Slayton of the MDEQ Waste Management and Radiological Protection office spoke on "Naturally Occurring Metals, Glaciation and Cleanup Criteria." All proceeds of this meeting benefited the CMU student chapter. Our December 2016 meeting will be held at Weber's Inn, Ann Arbor, MI, the speaker to be determined in the next month. The quarterly meetings have improved visibility for the AIPG and help us maintain participation by our professional and student chapter members.</p> <p>The Michigan Section also hosted a two-day work shop in June at the MDEQ's RAM Center focusing on "Environmental Risk Management: Why, When, Where and How." This was the sixth consecutive year for what has become a popular educational and networking event. For the last three years this event has been sold out (sold out 1 month before the event in 2016) with approximately 210 participants representing industry, regulatory agencies, and consulting firms.</p> <p>The Michigan Section hosts an annual golf outing in May to raise funds for educational grants and scholarships. The 2016 Golf Outing was held at a new venue, Moose Ridge Golf Course, in South Lyon. The annual summer field trip included a trip to the Fiborn Karst Preserve and Quarry and to Pictured Rocks/Grand Island Area in Munising on July 29-31, 2016. The field trip was a tremendous success (sold out!) and thoroughly enjoyed by all.</p>

	<p>During 2016, the Section continued its tradition of donating to geology education by giving the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$ • \$500 Sponsorship of the AIPG National Meeting • \$1,000 National Student Scholarship • \$1,000 to MAEOE • \$1,500 for Douglas Houghton Memorial Plaque (September 2016) • \$3,000 to Harris Nature Center Fossil Dig • \$3,000 annual undergraduate scholarship (September 2016) • \$4,000 to the Student Chapters of CMU, EMU, WMU and WSU <p>The Michigan Section also plans to donate \$3,000 to student posters presentations at our annual December 2016 meeting.</p>
<p>B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?</p>	<p>The Michigan Section continues to focus on student membership with Student Chapters established at Wayne State University, Central Michigan University, Eastern Michigan University, and Western Michigan University.</p>
<p>C) Problems/issues within section: How can National help?</p>	<p>Like many professional organizations, the Michigan Section faces challenges with maintaining and increasing our membership; generating ideas for meeting topics and securing speakers; and motivating membership to run for office. National can help us by foregoing increases in annual membership dues.</p>
<p>D) If AIPG had unlimited funds, what would you like to see?</p>	<p>This issue has not been discussed during our executive committee meetings. Cost will always be a limiting factor for any section. If national could assist with covering the costs for travel/lodging/field trips for national meeting attendees, it would allow our section to provide additional donations and scholarships. Davis, Professor Emeritus of Geological Engineering at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, was awarded the 2016 J.P. Gries Geologist of the Year award. The award is named in honor of the late Dr. John Paul Gries, a longtime geology professor at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, and is provided each year by the Section to a South Dakota geologist in recognition of exceptional work in the profession of geology.</p> <p>The annual meeting of the South Dakota section was held on March 23, 2016, in Pierre, South Dakota, in conjunction with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources' annual Environmental and Ground Water Quality Conference.</p> <p>Student outreach continued to be a routine activity for some AIPG members in South Dakota as an associate professor and an instructor regularly interacted with students at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. Similarly, students at the University of South Dakota were engaged with AIPG members through temporary employment with the South Dakota Geological Survey.</p> <p>The 2016 annual Section field trip was conducted on June 4, 2016 and consisted of a canoe trip down the Niobrara River in north-central Nebraska. This date was selected to encourage student participation. The 2017 annual Section field trip is planned for late August 2017, also to encourage student participation.</p>
B) Plans: How many universities do you plan to visit?	There are no special plans to visit universities in South Dakota. AIPG members are already in the roles of associate professor, instructor, and adjunct professor at one university and regularly interact with students at another university by employing Earth Science students at the South Dakota Geological Survey and through casual meetings during the school year.

A) 2016 Activities: What you have done for Student Outreach?	<p>The Student Research Symposium took place on Saturday, November 14th, 2015 at Riveredge Nature Center, Newburg, Wisconsin. More than 30 undergraduate and graduate students, from 7 WI colleges and universities (including UW-Stevens Point, UW-Madison, UW-Platteville, UW-Milwaukee, UW-Whitewater, UW-Baraboo and Carroll University) presented oral and poster presentations to an audience of their peers, family and the general public. WI AIPG was one of the sponsors of the Symposium and we provided 2 judges for the student oral presentations. We also had an AIPG table with organizational and job opportunity handouts. This November we will again be a sponsor and provide 3 judges for the presentations.</p> <p>On February 3, 2016, WI AIPG President Christine Lilek met with UW Eau Claire Geology Club students and university professors to discuss a student chapter, present job opportunities and start discussions on a partnership for a 2017 Frac Sand Mining workshop in the Eau Claire Area.</p> <p>The ten (11) day “Testing the Waters” educational adventure held from May 15 to May 25, 2016 on the Rock River in Wisconsin was staffed by university students from UW – Whitewater (WI AIPG’s Student Chapter University). The student and professor kayak paddlers used special equipment to take water quality samples along the Rock River from Mayville to Beloit, and stopped at communities along the way to share what they were learning and provided a forum for discussions about water quality and practical solutions. WI AIPG provide them lodging, breakfast and AIPG baseball caps on May 17th, an honor guard of a WI AIPG paddler on May 22nd, monetary support and river geology educational resources for the student use in schools through-out the Rock River watershed basin.</p> <p>We are working on finalizing a student scholarship fundraiser for September 2016 on the crowd fund raising website “GoFundMe”. By voting for the “best” geoscience project with \$5 a vote, WI AIPG will be acknowledging innovative geoscience projects in Wisconsin and supporting a scholarship fund for our future geoscience professionals. We have 3 competing projects: Geothermal Energy, Groundwater Barrier System, and Slope Stabilization projects. The funds raised will be used for Student Scholarships for our Wisconsin AIPG Student Chapter members.</p>
